## What is Participatory Action Research (PAR)?

- Driven by people who have a stake in the issue being researched, elevating their knowledge and expertise
- Builds research capacity in communities and ensures communities produce, own, and use knowledge
- Collaborative at every stage
- Intended to result in action, change, or improvement on the issue being researched

## What makes a strong research question?

- Relevant
- Novel
- Feasible
- Ethical
- Specific

## Types of research priorities

- Diagnosing/quantifying the problem
- Identifying drivers or points of intervention
- Understanding experiences and perceptions
- Identifying interventions
- Estimating projected impacts

#### Reminder: Goals of the WEP

- 1. Collaboratively develop a **transparent**, **coordinated**, **evidence-based** Community Plan that will...
  - <u>Identify</u> and <u>address</u> racial disparities across all components of Washtenaw County's juvenile and adult criminal legal systems

2. Collaboratively develop a framework for **implementation**, **ongoing oversight**, and **evaluation** of the Community Plan

• Ex: Substance use is a growing problem in Washtenaw and is a driver of criminalization

• Ex: Are drug charges a primary driver of racial disparities in jail incarceration?

- Ex as question: What is the role of drug charges as a driver of racial disparities in jail incarceration?
- Ex as statement: Identifying gaps in substance use treatment for people exposed to the criminal legal system
